Abortion Access Project

Organization: The Abortion Access Project (AAP) is a Massachusetts-based organization that increases the capacity of local communities nationwide to meet the full range of reproductive healthcare needs of their residents by promoting the availability of accessible abortion services. AAP works to ensure that all women facing unintended pregnancy have the option of safe, accessible abortion services. AAP engages in organizing, training, education, and technical assistance to increase the number of abortion providers, create and support systematic change within healthcare institutions to increase the availability of abortion services, and generate active support for abortion as part of comprehensive healthcare for women, particularly within the healthcare community.

Details: Internships are available based on AAP's specific project needs. In the past, interns have worked on projects related to religious refusal clauses, hospital referrals, and state licensing regulations for medical abortion providers. Internships are unpaid, but AAP is willing to work with your school if they grant credits for internships, or if work-study funds are available.

Organization: Since its inception in 1920, the ACLU has recognized that personal privacy and reproductive rights are among our most important constitutional liberties. For over twenty years, the ACLU's Reproductive Freedom Project has fought to expand reproductive rights and to protect those rights against government assaults.

Through coordinated litigation, public education, and organizing, the Project works to ensure that the decision whether to have a child is informed, meaningful, and protected from government interference. In all of its efforts, the Project works in collaboration with the ACLU's nationwide network of state affiliates. The Project offers summer internships as well as a yearly fellowship in reproductive rights.

Fellowship Information

Details: The Reproductive Freedom Project sponsors at least one fellow annually. The Fellow functions as an integral part of the Project's litigation teams. The Fellow provides legal research and analysis and may interview clients; draft pleadings, affidavits, and briefs; and participate in discovery. The Fellow may also do some public speaking and attend relevant conferences. The Fellowship is unique among reproductive rights positions in that it involves working with the ACLU's nationwide network of affiliates and attorneys in the organization who specialize in other civil liberties areas, including free speech, race and poverty issues, and lesbian and gay rights. The Fellowship is for one year, with a possible extension for a second year. The salary will be according to the ACLU salary scale; salaries begin in the low \$50,000s. Excellent health and welfare benefits are provided. The Fellow works out of the ACLU's offices in Manhattan.

Application: Applicants should send a résumé, letter of interest, three references, and legal writing sample to the attention of the Fellowship Coordinator. Fellowship applications are usually due at the end of November.

Internship Information

Details: Summer interns work on active litigation. Working closely with Project staff, interns assist in all aspects of litigation including legal research, factual investigation, and drafting of memoranda, affidavits, and briefs. The Project's cases include challenges to restrictions on access to abortion, including bans on abortion

procedures; laws that mandate parental involvement in minors' abortion decisions; and laws that deny Medicaid coverage for abortions. The Project also works to fight a myriad of new threats to reproductive choice, including efforts to restrict access to Mifepristone, to impose religious restrictions on reproductive healthcare through hospital mergers and other means, and to limit sex education to the teaching of abstinence. The Project is especially concerned with issues affecting poor women, teens, and women of color. Interns should pursue fellowships or other funding sources. For those without alternative funding, the Project may provide a modest stipend.

Application: Applicants should send a letter of interest, résumé, the names and telephone numbers of two references, and a legal writing sample of five to ten pages to the attention of the Internship Coordinator. Candidates are strongly encouraged to apply by January, but applications will be accepted until the positions are filled.

Details: The ACLU of Alaska has an annual unpaid summer internship for law students. While they are not solely focused on the issue of reproductive rights, such issues do comprise a significant portion of their legal caseload. The internships involve case intake work and interviewing prospective clients, and legal research. It is most likely that the reproductive rights element would arise in the last category. They are open to arranging internships during the school year for those schools with a work-study format. Please contact the office for more information.

Details: Legal interns work with all attorneys, including the attorney who handles reproductive rights issues. Student interns perform legal research and writing, and occasionally draft portions of court papers. When possible, interns attend appellate arguments, trial proceedings and depositions. There is also a limited amount of fact investigation and individual complaint resolution. Student interns also participate in legal staff meetings. Student interns work with one or more of our staff attorneys. Virtually all intern work involves civil liberties and constitutional law. The ACLU of Northern California's current priorities include: Lesbian & Gay Rights, Reproductive Rights, Immigrant Rights, Language Rights, Student Rights, Cyber Liberties, Race Discrimination/Racial Justice, Criminal Justice, Police Practices and First Amendment Rights. The ACLU of Northern California has internships available during the school year and during the summer. The full-time internship is 40 hours per week. The part-time internship is 16 hours per week minimum. Part-time internships are not available during the summer. "Split" summers are not allowed. Most students work for credit only. Some work-study funding is available; grant matches are considered. During the summer, stipends up to \$1,800 may be awarded. Students are encouraged to seek independent funding through their law school if available.

Application: Students should send one copy of their cover letter, résumé, writing sample and a list of references. Applicants are encouraged to submit information as early as possible as decisions are made on a rolling basis. Suggested application submission periods: Summer: September 1-December 31; fall: January 1-June 30; spring: July 1-October 31.

Details: ACLU externs and law clerks gain hands-on experience in the full range of civil liberties and constitutional rights cases. Students are involved in research and preparation of legal memoranda, fact investigations, client and witness interviews, discovery, pretrial motions, and handling of expert witnesses, as well as accompanying lawyers at court appearances. The ACLU Foundation of Southern California accepts applications for fall, spring and summer law clerks. Externships and summer law clerk positions are open to all law students. Students should be able to commit to a minimum of 20 hours each week during the school year. The ACLU of Southern California has limited resources and will be able to pay small stipends to only a few of its summer law clerks and externs. Students are encouraged to apply for Public Interest Law Foundation grants or other grants and to investigate work-study options as alternative sources of compensation.

Application: Students should submit their applications for a summer position beginning in November. Those applicants selected for interviews will be contacted; interviews may be conducted on the telephone for students living outside the Southern California area. Summer hiring decisions are made on a rolling basis. Most offers are made by January, though some may be made later in the Spring. Applications will not be considered without a cover letter and writing sample.

Applications for summer internships are due February 15; for fall internships, June 1; and for spring internships, October 15. All applications are considered on a rolling basis throughout the year. Applicants for summer positions will hear back no later than March 15.

Details: Legal interns assist senior staff counsel in litigation and other advocacy. Qualifications include self-motivation, commitment to civil liberties and reproductive rights, and excellent research and writing skills.

Details: Legal internships focus on civil liberties areas, but are not necessarily specific to reproductive rights. Interns may or may not be working on reproductive issues, depending on what the office is doing at the moment. The legal intake internship is designed to expose interns to the legal aspects of public interest work. Projects will mostly involve factual and legal research into constitutional issues such as students' rights, privacy, due process, religious freedom, gay and lesbian rights, and free speech. Interns will have an opportunity to work with the attorneys of the Legal Panel, who will assign projects and research. These internships are unpaid, but you will gain valuable information, powerful networks, and experience you can use. Hours and days are flexible and negotiable. Interns are expected to work a minimum of 8 hours per week.

Application: Interested individuals should submit a résumé and letter of interest. No phone calls. Deadline for fall internships is August 1.

Details: We offer unpaid internship opportunities year round. Potential projects include creating training materials for, observing, and participating in the judicial bypass process for minors seeking abortions who cannot obtain parental consent; creating a Reproductive Rights Handbook for Minors; lobbying the state legislature on choice issues (session in Jan/April in even years and Feb/March in odd years); and participating in any current choice litigation.

- Details: The Yolanda Gregory Scott Interns work with the legal staff to help process requests for legal assistance by fielding phone calls, helping with general case investigation and research, and providing general office support. Interns work on reproductive rights issues, but the Maryland ACLU cannot guarantee that an intern would be able to work solely on that issue. Start and end dates and hours are flexible. They prefer a commitment of at least 8 hours per week for at least 10 weeks during the school year. Summer interns are expected to work at least 2 or 3 days a week; full-time interns are preferred. The Maryland ACLU offers internships for credit only; all internships are unpaid.
- Application: Interested applicants should send a résumé, short writing sample (12 pages), 3 references, transcript and a cover letter explaining why you want to intern with the ACLU-MD and what sort of time commitment you can offer. It should highlight what you can offer the ACLU and let us know whether there are any issues you are particularly interested in. Recommended application deadlines: fall (Sept. 15); spring (Dec. 1); summer (Apr. 1). Applications are considered on a rolling basis and are accepted until positions are filled. Positions are competitive.

Details: Legal interns perform a wide range of tasks, from legal research and writing, to help with discovery, fact investigations, and on occasion, trial. Internships are available full-time in the summer and part-time in the school year. Summer interns generally are able to obtain public interest funding from their schools; we have at times participated in the work-study program for eligible students.

Application: The deadline to apply for summer internships is December 31. Applications for the school year are accepted on a rolling basis. Applicants should submit a cover letter and résumé.

Details: A legal internship with the American Civil Liberties Union of Michigan provides students with a unique opportunity to work on cutting edge civil liberties and civil rights cases. The ACLU litigates impact cases addressing a wide range of constitutional issues such as free speech, religious freedom, reproductive rights, right to privacy, right to due process and equal protection, voting rights, and the rights of people of color, women, gay men and lesbians, and prisoners. Law students may be asked to work on many aspects of potential and ongoing cases such as: drafting memoranda addressing the merits of a case, meeting with and

interviewing plaintiffs and witnesses, and drafting complaints and briefs. Students may also be asked to analyze the constitutionality of pending legislation or help with discovery. Legal interns will be supervised by the legal director. They will sometimes be asked to assist a cooperating attorney on a pending case or to work with the executive director, legislative director, Post 911 Project staff attorney, Racial Justice Project staff attorney and/or LGBT Project staff attorney. The ACLU of Michigan usually has at least one reproductive rights case on its docket; however, interns work on a broad range of civil liberties issues. Applicants must have finished their first year of law school, have strong research and writing skills, and have a commitment to civil liberties and civil rights. Students who have studied constitutional law are preferred. Most law schools will give students credit for an ACLU internship during the school year or the summer. Some law schools offer student-funded fellowships or other grants to ACLU summer interns. Unfortunately, the ACLU cannot afford to pay its interns.

Details: Legal interns work on a broad range of civil liberties issues, including reproductive rights. Interns investigate complaints to the ACLU-MN; interview complainants; contact government agencies; use the data practices act to obtain information; write summaries of investigation findings; assist legal staff in preparing reports to the ACLU-MN Board of Directors; respond to requests for information from the public; assist in monitoring civil liberties issues in the legislature; gather information for lobbying, research and writing related to legislation that impacts civil liberties; maintain contact with allied organizations; and conduct legal

research on potential civil liberties violations. Applicant should be a law student with experience in legal research and writing; have an interest in and commitment to the preservation of civil liberties; have experience with online legal research, Microsoft Word, Access and Excel; have the ability to work with a diverse population in a professional manner; have good problem solving and information gathering skills, have knowledge of how government and bureaucracies work; and have knowledge of basic information resources. Spring and summer interns must commit a minimum of 15 hours per week. Starting date is flexible, and schedule is flexible as to number of hours per day and which days are worked each week. This is an unpaid internship.

Details: While the job description is not project-specific, reproductive rights is a central aspect of ACLU-EM's work protecting civil liberties, and law clerks often sign up to focus on specific subject areas like reproductive rights.

Interns will gain hands-on experience working on real cases; improve legal research and writing skills; get extensive feedback on written product; learn how to manage case files and develop strong client communication skills; work on complex, cutting-edge constitutional law and civil liberties issues; work on a wide variety of legal matters; if Rule 13 is certified, have the opportunity to participate in court hearings and other legal procedures; meet and work with a wide variety of attorneys; work in a relaxed environment with flexible hours; and may qualify for work-study or public interest stipends. Duties

include assisting the Legal Director in developing cases for litigation; conducting legal research on civil liberties matters; preparing legal memoranda analyzing Constitutional Law and Civil Liberties issues; drafting demand letters, pleadings, and briefs in cases; interviewing clients and engaging in client counseling; attending meetings of the ACLU-EM Legal Steering Committee; attending court hearings on cases; participating in other special intern activities; organizing and managing case files; and meeting with lawyers and clients as needed in cases. A legal clerkship for first, second or third-year law students is available year-round. Applicants should have basic legal research and writing skills, be familiar with Lexis or Westlaw, and have an interest in constitutional law and civil liberties, though coursework in these areas is not necessary.
